





Your support changes lives

Six year-old Martha is a happy little girl. Like most children her age she loves to play with LEGO, bounce on her trampoline and spend time at the beach. When Martha was just two weeks old her parents were given some very worrying news.



Their little baby had Septo-Optic Dysplasia, a rare brain disorder where the optic nerve fails to develop properly in-utero. There is no cure, and many people with this diagnosis will experience severe vision loss for their whole lives. Martha is completely blind. Unlike the majority of people living with vision loss, Martha doesn't have any light perception at all.

The first years of a child's life are full of change, wonder and potential. For children with vision loss, this time of growth is no different – but it may take longer for them to reach developmental milestones compared to children with sight. Living with low vision or blindness affects a child's understanding of the world, hindering their motivation to move around or explore.

Thanks to your support, we are able to provide specialist support to children like Martha and their families, helping them to develop alternatives for interacting with their environment.

Because of the generosity our kind supporters, Martha and her family continue to thrive.

"The team at Guide Dogs has been part of our lives since she was tiny,"

says Martha's mum, Gemma.

"Guide Dogs Orientation & Mobility
Specialists have taught Martha so much. By
the time she was four, she had already learnt
how to explore and move around safely with
a white cane. The team helped us realise
that everything would be fine. Martha would
be able to do almost everything that other
kids can do – we just needed to find a
different way to go about some of them."

The support has also helped Martha to be resilient. The team are kind, patient and supportive but there's no attitude of 'poor little Martha, she can't see,' which, sadly, still happens sometimes when we're out and about.

Martha has recently begun her second year of primary school and thanks to the generous support of people like you, she is thriving.

It's always a pleasure to watch children like Martha develop their skills. Before Martha started school, the Guide Dogs team spent time helping her to move around safely and independently. This involved experiences such as playing at the park to explore different ways of moving, like playing on swings or jumping on a trampoline.

In 2021, the team focused on supported Martha in her first year at school, ensuring she could move around independently, join in with classroom activities and help her engage with her classmates.

Martha learnt skills such as turning her head to face the person she's talking to. And her classmates and teachers were supported to start conversations by letting Martha know who is speaking and ensure that she can join in. It might be something as simple as helping conversations flow during recess.

For a blind child, so much of what's going on can be missed unless people around them help them understand. So for example, we'll encourage Martha's friends to tell her what's going on. It might be something simple like 'Hey Martha – I'm eating a bag of popcorn today. What's in your lunchbox?' to ensure Martha knows what's going on around her.

Martha was also supported to find her way around school, for example, by putting small pieces of velcro on her classroom door so she could feel her way into the right room.


Whilst Martha felt most comfortable holding hands with an adult at the beginning of the school year, it didn't take long for her to move around much more independently, using her long cane to explore her world safely.

"Without Guide Dogs, I have no idea what our lives might be like," said Gemma. "They've helped change everything for us. They have helped Martha to live and experience life. They've not just taught Martha, but they've taught us. We are so very grateful for everything."

Founder and inaugural President of Guide Dogs SA/ NT, Frank Beauchamp, sadly passed away on 29 December 2021, aged 89.

Francis Todd 'Frank' Beauchamp was the originator of the Guide Dog movement in South Australia and the Northern Territory. In 1957, Frank and the APEX Club of Adelaide launched the Guide Dogs Association of South Australia, the first organisation of its kind in the state. It was Frank's vision to ensure that there would be a lifechanging Guide Dog available to everyone who needed one.

Thanks to Frank and his contemporaries, Guide Dogs SA/NT now has a long and exemplary history of training and partnering Guide Dogs with those who need them. Today, over 60 years later, we continue to service Frank's vision to empower people living with low vision, blindness and specialised support needs and their families to achieve independence, participation, inclusion and wellbeing.

Frank is survived by his beloved wife, Judith. He was a much-loved father and father-in-law to Angela and Bill, James and Wendy, Andrew and Lisa and Dave and Pam. He will be remembered by his 11 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

Frank's incredible legacy will live on in the hearts and minds of the many people whose lives have been forever changed by his work.





Bruce Ind has been part of the Guide Dogs SA/NT family since 2003. A Guide Dogs client, Bruce is also former Deputy Chair of the Guide Dogs SA/NT Board, former Chair of the Client Advisory Committee and a passionate advocate for people living with low vision or blindness.

And he's testimony to the saying 'good things come in threes', as Guide Dogs SA/NT Client and Handler Bruce recently welcomed his third Guide Dog, Oakland.

Guide Dog, Wallace, is putting his paws up for a well-deserved rest and retiring after proudly handing over the harness to new Guide Dog graduate, Oakland.

Bruce lives with Stargardt disease which has resulted in a deterioration in his sight over the years. After retiring, he began walking more frequently, prompting his family to suggest he look into getting his first Guide Dog, Keeley, in October 2005.

"The first time I went out with Keeley I realised that there was a learning curve, I had to show clearly that I trusted her and give her a chance to trust me," Bruce said.

"It was the same with Wallace and now with Oakland. You can't grab hold of the harness and walk off into the sunset, you need to develop some sort of trust.

"I'm a reasonably confident person but the confidence that I had when I was working with a Guide Dog increased. "My wife continually says that when we go for a walk – particularly the two of us with me working the Guide Dog – invariably, people walking towards us will look at the dog, then look at me and at my face, then look back at the dog and smile. It's that immediate."

Bruce said he and his wife are enjoying getting to know Oakland and watching how the two get along.

"Wallace and Oakland are getting on very well," he said.

"You tend to anthropomorphise and put human emotions and human characteristics onto your dog. When Keeley was coming up to retirement and then as Wallace was coming up to retirement, you are concerned about how they're going to feel and how they will respond to a new dog coming into the pack.


"Of course, the trainers at Guide Dogs see this many times and they know that as long as they're fed, looked after and getting attention, then it's okay.

"Wallace is much more reserved than Oakland. While he is very happy most of the time, he doesn't wag his tail. Oakland has got a lovely wagging tail which is really excellent.

"However, when you sing 'Happy Birthday', Wallace will jump around...so he's got that. He also doesn't tend to like being patted much but Oakland does."


Q&R Litter Puppies


Guide Dog

For this reason, Remi has chosen to take on the hardest career of all: motherhood.



Post-traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) Support Dogs

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Celebrating 50 years

2022 marks 50 years since Margaret Williams joined the Guide Dogs family.

"I had problems with my sight since I was a little girl," says Margaret. "I'm totally blind in my left eye and have 5 percent vision in the right."

Margaret was first supported by the team at Guide Dogs in 1972, receiving Orientation and Mobility training to enable her to move around safely and independently. "I was very nervous to start with," recalls Margaret. "In fact, I was dangerous! The police once stopped me crossing the road without my white cane. I had to admit I'd left it in my handbag."

"I knew then it was time to take things seriously. Guide Dogs helped me learn to use my cane and I began catching buses from my home in the southern suburbs into the city.

I had no confidence at all to start with, but before long I was travelling to and from work and going out to restaurants in the evenings."

Margaret met her husband, Bob, and enjoyed a diverse working life; first in a childcare centre, then as a nanny, and finally in aged and palliative care.

Margaret was matched with her first Guide Dog, Ives, in 2005. "Ives was the most

beautiful boy," says Margaret. "He was a real character and gave 100 percent every single day, never missing a beat."

Ives stayed by Margaret's side after retiring from working life, providing companionship to Margaret and Bob and enjoying a well-deserved rest.

In 2013, Margaret was matched with her second Guide Dog, Vigo. "Vigo and Ives got along instantly. They were best of friends, no trouble at all. Vigo was such a loyal, sensitive dog. He was by my side every minute of the day. He'd even sit patiently on the bath mat whilst I showered."

After Vigo sadly passed away, Margaret made the decision to return to using her long cane. "I'd used it for 24 years before Ives and Vigo, so it was an easy transition."

Margaret spent many years as a valued Guide Dogs volunteer and today celebrates 15 years as a Guide Dogs Puppy Sponsor, giving a regular gift to the organisation to breed, raise and train the next generation of working dogs to follow in Ives' and Vigo's paw prints.

"I understand how valuable Guide Dogs are for people like me" says Margaret. "But my real passion is supporting the Assistance Dogs program. Knowing my contribution helps train puppies that will go on to supporting children with autism is very rewarding. These are such special dogs that make a real difference."





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
